A CHRISTMAS CRACKER.

Our first team game against Bisterne on the 22nd had the hallmark of a great game and we weren't disappointed as our report shows.

Three new names enter our goal charts,
Tony Pharoah Steve Tubbz and Chris Edge.

1.12.84 TELEPHONE SPORTS (A) We were
ripped apart. This was a day best forgotten
as we crumbled under Tele Sports attacks. After
only 20min, a right wing run and cross found
an unmarked Tele C.F. and a crisp header
made it 1-0. Straight from the re-start we
counter attacked on the left to see Martin
Pharoah go close with a rasping right foot drive.
Steve Norman hit the rebound into the mucus but
the ball was scrambled away.

Slowly we climbed into the game and in the 40th
minute Norman was floored just outside the
box. The resultant free kick was cleverly flighted
by Carter and found Richards head 1-1.
Another Verwood attack this time featuring Foster
almost put us ahead after a maze dribble and
left foot shot was luckily fingertipped away
by Tele's keeper.

An immediate counter attack had our defence at sixes and sevens and a goalmouth scramble let Teles in for an easy goal.
A 55th minute free kick - a rare Ashley Long mistake - 3-1.

In the second half we tried to raise our game but Teles had us on the back with both their wing men penetrating our defence.

A long Giavera clearance found Norman and our irrepressible Cf. wounded his marker and slipped the ball past an advancing keeper 3-2. Teles yet again lashed into us and inevitably got their fourth from a corner in the 75th min. We were lucky in the closing stages to keep the deficit to two goals.

8.12.84 BLUEBIRD (H) Dorset Snr Cup.

We took the game to Bluebird from the start and after only three minutes Richards broke on the right and was unlucky to see his shot blocked on the line.

Edge Jubb and Syres all providing masterful touches in the muddle of the park contained the odd Bluebird attack.

In the sixteenth minute Foster jinked his way through on the right and a cracking cross was smashed home on the volley by Steve Richards. Bluebird battled back but their R.W. raid was stopped dead by a strong shuttle challenge.

Tony Pharoah joining his attack sparked off another raid but Norman's shot was narrowly wide.

The second half followed the same trend as the first with Verwood storming to the attack. Martin Pharoah was creating havoc on the wing and was unlucky to see a left foot shot clip the bar and go over.

Carter and Syres then went close before Bluebird won a corner in the 72nd minute from which scores were levelled.

In the 74th minute Bluebird went in front from a deflected free kick outside the box. We fought back but couldn't turn our superiority into goals and went down 2-1. There is no doubt though that we outplayed Bluebird and certainly have nothing to fear in our forthcoming league games with them.

15.12.84 RINGWOOD (A) We met a poor Ringwood side and smashed them 6-1. Bloodring both Hollowell and Heskiag in a full game manager Rod Lock saw for the first time the qualities of our new club members.

Martin Pharoah in sparkling form once again, took only eight minutes to impose his audacious talents on the game. Outstripping his full back on the left, cutting inside he unleashed a tremendous 25 yard right foot shot that hit the net before the goalkeeper moved.

2 minutes later he again had the Ringwood defence in knots with a dazzling run and a shot from the edge of the box that was tipped over by the keeper.

It was one way traffic as Foster made it 2-0 in the 20th minute with a 30 yard rocket.

25 minutes and Tony Pharoah won a 20yard race chipping the ball over an advancing goalkeeper 3-0. Verwood were rampant.

30 minutes and Norman almost made it 4 with a right foot shot that just cleared the bar.

55 minutes and Martin Pharoah was pulled down in the area allowing Steve Norman to fire home the penalty.

60 minutes and Chris Edge soared to meet a high corner 5-0

70 minutes saw Tubb smash a volley into the net after Hollowell curled up a delightful ball

80 minutes was consolation time when Ringwood pulled one back to finalise scoring 6-1.

22. 12. 84 BISTERNE (A) This game provided the thrills and spills of two teams near the top of the table.

Bisterne set off as usual at a 100 m.p.h. we countered at 101 mph. Long was soon in action dealing competently with a headed corner and was looking sound. Tony Pharaoh and Martin Shuttle at the back ably supporting Jubb and Hollowell coped with all thrown at them until the 13th minute where a harsh decision gave Bisterne a penalty 1-0.

We attacked from the re-start and in the 15th minute had a goal disallowed by a linesman's twisted view. The 5 man move and Norman's finish deserved better.

Jubbs, outstanding in defence and coping with a lively C.F. was able to combine with Carter and Byres to set up a counter attack, after a Bisterne raid, but Foster was unlucky to have a right foot shot scrambled away.

Unceasing wind and rain became our ally in the second half and gradually we got on top. Relentless pressure paid off in the 55th minute where Richards rose majestically to level scores from a corner.

Five minutes later we went ahead when Byres crossed a ball that sifted into the top corner. Bisterne fought back and levelled scores in the 75th minute with a header following a deep cross from the right.

Verwood cracked back and in the 80th minute a glorious diving Carter header made it 3-2. The last 10 minutes was nail biting stuff as both sides were close but it was Verwood who ran off winners of this titanic battle.



VERWOOD RESERVES

112.84 TALBOT RISE (H) Lady luck plays a vital role in the world of football. Whether it is during a top class professional match or a local schoolboy game "she's" always there and if on your side you will doubtless benefit to some degree. Unfortunately when you need her most "she" generally deserts and so it proved when we entertained Talbot Rise in this home fixture. Despite an encouraging start to the season recent results haven't been too good so a decent scoreline was desperately wanted.

The first half saw us start confidently and we coped admirably well with Talbot's early raids. Then on the break out of defence Dan Salmon burst clear, beat the goalkeeper only to see the ball rebound from a post. Shortly afterwards Nigel Clark chipped the keeper and this time the ball hit the cross bar. an exciting stuff but then the referee harshly ruled Mike Creed handling the ball and a penalty was given. Peter Prince bringing off a fantastic save then brilliantly blocked the shot from the rebound. In our next attack Dan Salmon had a clear opening but hit the post yet again. Talbot rode their luck and two goals before the interval gave them an embarrassing lead. A third 2 minutes into the second half sealed the game but we managed to reduce the arrears when Dan Robertson crossed for Nigel Clark to head home. Talbot scored a fourth in the closing stages - ironically off the inside of an upright.

15.12.84 ST. GEORGES (A) A fine battling display saw our Reserves fight back from a goal deficit to gain their first win in 5 matches.

After looking good in the early stages Verwood found themselves a goal down when St. Georges forward slotted the ball home following a harsh free kick decision against us.

Hoskings making his debut for the Reserves had a "goal" ruled offside before John Holmes chested home the equaliser following good work by Mick Goukles on the touch line.

A dangerous break just before the interval by St. Georges saw their winger gracefully somersault landing in a heap 3 yards the wrong side of the touchline. Steve Turner was promptly booked for his "mistimed" tackle.

15 minutes into the second half we took the lead when Mick Goukles glanced in a header following Dan Salmon's corner. From then on it was backs to the wall as St. Georges pressed for the equaliser. Rick Sweatland performed well in goal whilst Barry Hollowell, also playing his first game was a dominant figure in the heart of our defence.
